

Letter from Fr Richard January 2020

A Happy New Year.

January is the time when the days of Christmas give way to Epiphany and the new year begins. Of course, we have had a general election which should bring some sort of closure to the Brexit debate. My hope is that 2020 will bring greater unity to our nation which has felt unsettled and divided over recent years – an answer I hope to the many prayers for peace.

I am not a great watcher of soaps although I do listen to *The Archers* from time to time. In the run-up to Christmas I did see the trailers for *Eastenders* which filled me with a sense of despair. I am aware that their Christmas programmes have more than the usual amount of grimness in their storylines. What upset me was the reaction of Phil Mitchell to some piece of bad news. His response was to throw a chair across the room in an angry show of violence.

I suppose that reasoned debate and earnest conflict resolution do not make for exciting television but they do result in happier lives. My worry is that this kind of violently dramatic behaviour becomes accepted as the norm because its what they do on TV. A bit like *Spinal Tap* where the dial is always turned up to 11. My hope for the coming year is one of peace. Peace in our nation, peace in our families, peace in our hearts. But none of us really know what the coming year will bring.

Epiphany is the time of the year when we remember the coming of the Magi from the East to meet the Christ-child. They brought symbolic gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gold for a king; frankincense for a priest; and myrrh to anoint the dead. These Wise Men represent the gentile world who seek out Jesus. Although they came from Persia – today's Iran – they are usually portrayed as multicultural: from Africa Europe and China

Epiphany means *manifestation* and, in this act, God makes himself manifest to all humankind. He reveals the fulness of his nature as truly human and truly divine. He came as the Prince

of Peace to bring peace to a divided world. May this New Year be a time of peace to you and to your families. May you seek and find Christ's peace in your hearts and your lives.


