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Letter from Fr Richard April 2020

Difficult times...

I recently looked at some old copies of the parish magazine dating from the 1950s and 60s. It is difficult to see what was going on in the world from the content since the church seemed to be carrying on as normal. Clearly, we are not in normal times. I am writing this as the nation begins to take a whole series of measures that are affecting us all.

Like everyone I am staying at home and only going out when I have to – this usually means taking funerals or doing a bit of shopping. And, like everyone else, I have been using the telephone rather more and have begun to discover the delights of using Zoom for conference calls. As I have telephoned individuals, I have been heartened by the fact that it seems that everyone I have spoken to told me that they have made the effort to phone others and that other people have phoned them. It seems that rather than being isolated a new – and slightly different - sense of community is developing.

As a church we are sending this magazine out by email which will restrict the readership – so feel free to forward it to your friends. Hopefully normal service will be resumed as soon as possible.

At the time of writing I do not know what the situation will be but we can expect dark times ahead. The situation in China seems to have improved so that there is light at the end of the tunnel but at the moment we are still in that tunnel.

A few years ago, when Ann and I were on holiday in New England, we made a pilgrimage to Robert Frost's grave in Bennington in Vermont. In that poem Frost uses the phrase 'Good fences make good neighbours'. In an attempt to be good neighbours, Colin Bowes has been mending the church boundary wall...



Did you know that we had a hole in the wall at Burghwallis? To be more precise, a hole in the churchyard wall, not the cash machine type, so you can put your credit cards away! The section of collapse was on the churchyard side of the wall adjacent to the footpath between the church drive and Burghwallis Hall. It is a typical

stone wall, well actually two stone walls with a cavity in between. The cavity is packed with small stones and rubble (the fill) this is to stop the two walls collapsing into each other as they normally taper toward each other as they reach the top, the whole is then topped with *copestones* to hold the structure together.

The repair. A section of about 1 metre in length was taken down to the *footings* just below ground level to reach a firm base, then gradually built up with larger stones at the bottom

sliding them into the sides where possible and filling in the cavity with small stones and rubble as each course was completed. The row of copestones had been mortared in and was supported by the opposite wall which had remained intact. To complete the repair the upper courses had to be jig-sawed in and



wedged with thin stones where necessary.

Also, in the churchyard. The area where rubble was moved to from the southwest corner of the churchyard by the working party two years ago in order to fill in a hollow, has now settled sufficiently for it to be levelled. Grass and natural herbage are gradually taking over and can be mown with



the rest of the churchyard. Filling in the hollow is a long-term project which is mid-way to completion.

Burghwallis Parish Council News

Due to the current situation, all meetings of the Parish Council, including the Annual Meeting, due to be held in May, have been cancelled until further notice. As soon as the situation changes, we will reschedule meetings and advertise them in the usual way.

Planned events such as the Great British Spring Clean litter pick have been cancelled, and, hopefully will be rescheduled in September. That is not to say that all clean up activity will cease. Members of the PC will still do litter picking, but as individuals, or couples, where those people already live together anyway.

Doncaster MBC have temporarily ceased green bin collections from Monday 23rd March.

Bus services are running at a reduced schedule, though concessionary travel passes can be used before 9.30 am. Details of revised services can be found on the SYPTE website

An Easter Reflection: Mary Magdalene

As the traditional Easter story is rehearsed again this month, you may notice that there is one name that frequently occurs. It is that of the 'other' Mary – not the mother of Jesus, but Mary of Magdalene, who stood by her at the cross and became the first human being actually to meet the risen Christ.

That's quite a record for a woman who, the Gospels tell us, had been delivered by Jesus from 'seven devils' – New Testament language for some dark and horrible affliction of body, mind or spirit. As a result, her devotion to Him was total and her grief at His death overwhelming.

In church history Mary Magdalene became the 'fallen woman' a harlot who was rescued and forgiven by Jesus but there is no evidence to prove she was a 'fallen woman' but the contrast is sublime, Mary the virgin mother, the symbol of purity. Mary Magdalene, the scarlet woman who was saved and forgiven, the symbol of redemption. Surely, we all fall somewhere between those two extremes.


The dark cloud from which she was delivered may have been sexual, we are not told. What we do know is that the two Marys stood together at the cross, the Blessed Virgin and the woman rescued from who knows what darkness and despair. The second great moment for her was as unexpected as it was momentous. She had gone with other women to the tomb of Jesus and found it empty. An angelic figure told them that Jesus was not there, He had risen – and the others drifted off. But Mary stayed, reluctant to leave it like that. She became aware of a man nearby, whom she took to be the gardener. She explained to Him that the body of 'her Lord' had been taken away and she didn't know where to find Him.


The man simply said her name 'Mary' and she instantly realised it was Jesus. She made to hug Him, but He told her not to touch Him because his resurrection was not yet complete. She was, however, to go to the male disciples and tell them she had met Him. She did – but they couldn't believe her.

Her words – 'I have seen the Lord' – echo down the centuries, the very beating heart of the Christian gospel.













A short story from the Bible


Rotas
