One of my favourite Poems is by the Welsh Anglican priest R.S. Thomas. It is called *The Bright* Field. In this poem Thomas speaks of the sun breaking through and illuminating a small field. In seeing this he recalls today's gospel reading in which the bright field is the field that contains the hidden treasure. A man spends all

he has to buy the field to possess it and the treasure it contains.

It is part of Jesus' explanation of what the kingdom of heaven is like: it is like the small mustard seed that grows into a tree, or the fisherman's net that is cast out and brings in many different fish, or the pearl of great price that the merchant values above everything else.
